Presenter

Rev. Sandhya Rani Jha



Raised in an interracial and multi-faith family and witness to the sometimes subtle (and sometimes obvious) ways that racism and xenophobia show up in our society, it is not surprising that **Sandhya Rani Jha**'s career has been marked by work to affect public policy change (having worked in the office of Congressman Thomas C. Sawyer from Akron, Ohio), religious liberty and an alternative voice to the religious right (at The Interfaith Alliance), and around the issues of housing for all (at East Bay Housing Organizations), as well as, their work to build what Dr. Martin Luther King called Beloved Community (most recently, at the Oakland Peace Center).

Sandhya provides anti-oppression, cultural humility, and

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion consulting and coaching for companies, higher education institutions, non-profits, and faith organizations. From 2016-2023 they were an instructor with the <u>Emerging Leaders Program at the Leadership Institute at Allen Temple</u> as well as teaching at several seminaries between 2014 and 2023.

A passionate reader and writer, Sandhya is the author of <u>Room at the Table</u>, the history of people of color in the Disciples of Christ, and <u>Pre-Post-Racial America</u>: <u>Spiritual Stories</u> <u>from the Front Lines</u> on the subject of race and spirituality in America. Pre-Post-Racial America was listed as one of the top five books on race and religion in 2015 by Publishers Weekly. Sandhya's book <u>Transforming Communities</u>: <u>How People Like You are Healing</u> <u>Their Neighborhoods</u> focuses on concrete ways that regular people are creating change community-by-community in an era where positive change can feel impossible. Sandhya's 2020 book, <u>Liberating Love</u>, is a 365-day devotional of love notes from God, connecting us to the people who inhabit the 66 books of the Bible and connecting us to God and each other at a time it is so easy to feel isolated. <u>Rebels, Despots, and Saints</u>, a book about ancestors (and activism), came out January 2023.

Ordained at National City Christian Church in 2005 as a Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) minister, Sandhya is proud to have received both a Master of Divinity and Master of Public Policy from the University of Chicago, where their joint thesis was on the subject of *"Public Goods, Public Bads, the Common Good and the Common Burden: Environmental Racism as a case study on the intersection of Public Policy and Theological Ethics."* Sandhya gets far more excited about urban policy than a normal person should and loves to sing folk, jazz, and gospel even though they were trained in classical music.

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Host Organization History – First Congregational UCC,

Oconomowoc



1841

In the town of Summit, 10 pioneers with the help of Rev. Stephen Peet, became The First Presbyterian Church of Summit, meeting in each other's homes.

1845

Both churches decided to divide. Summit resumed their original name and governance. Oconomowoc continued as Congregationalists which gave us our present name. It consisted of 31 members.

1863

The Oconomowoc and Summit church came together again as one church.



1961

It was voted and approved to accept the Constitution of the United Church of Christ. Many families dropped membership and pursued a lawsuit with the church. It was one of several test-cases nationally which was eventually won by the church.

1977

The Long-Range Planning Committee agreed to recommend "constructing a new building on a new site." It took 7 years to reach an agreement to let go of "Little White, New-England Meeting House" to purchase 22 acres in the city.

1843

With people traveling from Oconomowoc, they decided to form a separate church in Oconomowoc adopting the Congregational form of government and changed the name to First Congregational Church of Summit and Oconomowoc.



1852

Rev. Sidney Barteau accepted the call as paster after 4 years of the church not having a pastor and worshiping with the Methodists. The first church was built, a little white New-England style on the corner of Church St. and South St.

1885

New Year's morning the new church was first dedicated.

1967

Rev. Charles Lowder accepted a call to our church. A new Constitution was adopted, new boards and committees were created to help get things done within the church. The church was busier than ever.



1983

The first woman, Deborah Howland was ordained to the ministry in First Congregational UCC, Oconomowoc.

1984 Approval for a new

2015 Rev. David Schnepf was called as our new Senior Pastor.

1985

A formal dedication of the new church took place.

1987

Rev. Charles Lowder announced his retirement after 20 years.

1992

Building Fund Campaign was kicked off to build a new church office, music room, additional classrooms and elevator access between floors.

1998

"Ignite the Spirit, Burn the Mortgage" kicked off to become debt free to utilize the former mortgage payments to be used in more meaningful ways in the life of the church.

Our Hearts and Hands Preschool began to be operated within our church.

2005

"Building With Faith... For All the People" campaign began for an expansion of our sanctuary.

2013

Rev. Stephen Welch announced his retirement after 25 years.

2023

Annual Meeting Minutes—Saturday, April 29, 2023



Dear Members of the Southeast Association,

Somehow in the frenzy and joy of meeting together again in-person last spring, we have lost the minutes for our meeting on Saturday, April 29, 2023.

In lieu of minutes, we ask that you accept this letter of witness, in which we will share with you our recollections of the day which have been affirmed by others present in Grafton at Pilgrim UCC with us last spring.

Those assembled were more than enough people to establish quorum. We accepted the Annual Report including the minutes from our meeting in 2022, the Mission Team report, the Church & Ministry Report, and our ministry partners reports. Rev. Franz Rigert, Conference Minister brought greetings to our Association Meeting. The Nominating Team presented their slate which was overwhelmingly approved, and they thanked everyone who was serving the Association in a leadership role.

The 2024 proposed budget and our financial report from 2022 was presented by Moderator Brittany Barber as the Association did not have a Financial Secretary during 2022. From her script for that day – her report partially read:

- The Administrative Team realizes that association dues based on membership numbers from the previous United Church of Christ Annual Report – can put some congregations in a sticky situation as we are trying to re-emerge from the pandemic – as we are all a little less certain of our actual membership numbers these days. If your congregation is unsure of or unable to pay the total amount cited in your dues letter – please communicate your congregation's difficulties with the Association. As always with our polity – these dues are part of our covenantal relationship – yet if it is impossible for your congregation to meet this expectation, please just let us know.
- Now to the numbers that are before you, as I mentioned before, the income of the SE Association was volatile in 2022. Over many years, we have relied upon our Operating Fund Reserves to balance our budgets. Today, these reserves have been exhausted to approximately \$13,500 as of the end of 2022. While we do not have set operational costs that are great – we do need to maintain some balance in our accounts to responsibly conduct our business. As our reserves have dwindled, we have come to a time when we will not be able to meet the budget that we passed at our Annual Meeting last year for this budget year.

• So, on the pages in front of you, you will find an amended 2023 budget that has been slimmed down by just over \$10,000 – based on our tempered expectations for our 2023 dues income. The Administrative Team, as part of our work throughout the year, has adopted this amended 2023 budget.

Those assembled overwhelmingly accepted the amended 2023 budget and proposed 2024 budget.

Our meeting included the installation of officers for 2023 with our ACMs Rev. Rachel Bauman and Rev. Jane Anderson.

At the end of our business meeting, we introduced our Keynote Speaker the Rev. Rebecca Anderson, co-pastor of both Gilead Church and Bethany UCC, Chicago with Rev. Vince Amlin. Rebecca spoke on the importance of storytelling and how we might incorporate the use of storytelling in worship. Her humor and insights were a breath of fresh air for many of our attendees.

We are sorry for the loss of the minutes, and yet are also still excited by the worship, fellowship, and learning that took place a year ago at our 2023 Annual Meeting at Pilgrim UCC in Grafton.

Associate Conference Minister Report Wisconsin Conference UCC Serving the Northeast and Southeast Associations

Greetings Siblings in Christ,

I am grateful for you and the wonderful ways you continue to Be the Church. Your ministry matters. In a world that is often filled with messages and acts of hate, shining forth the Love of Christ in heartfelt, tangible ways matters. Please know that I and the conference staff deeply appreciate that wondrous ways you show up and shine the light of God's love in the world, offering hope, peace, grace, and mercy to others.

I consider it a privilege to continue to serve as your Associate Conference Minister. This year we continue to see more of our churches and association meetings return to being in person. However, many continue to do have and online presence. A number continue to hold meetings and do their work online, for sake of convenience and efficiency. Some are choosing to adapt to a hybrid approach, and some will meet at least once a year in person. This has required all of us to continue to adjust and adapt the way in which we gather and continue to do our work together, including the technology needed to support our ministries. Furthermore, this hybrid way of life poses its own questions and challenges. For example, how do we create community in virtual space? How do we care for one other online? Moreover, how do we continue to build meaningful ministry, mission, and community in an online/hybrid world? We, as staff, are continuing to explore with leadership how we can best resource our churches and communities as we live into these new realities.

This year we have seen several changes to our conference staff. Susan Taylor retired as our full-time administrative associate the end of 2023. She remains with us part-time as search and call coordinator, for which we are grateful. We welcome a new office coordinator Andrea Vik beginning 2/12/24. I am grateful for how our staff has grown and deepened our working relationships. It certainly has served us well as we moved our offices from DeForest to our new home at Daycholah Center. We have been warmly welcomed there and we are grateful.

Both the staff and I deeply appreciate the prayers and support for our covenantal ministry in the association. I will continue to help resource our churches as faithfully to the best of my abilities in the year ahead.

Transitions

In the last year, I've worked with 34 churches in transition—22 in NEA and 12 in SEA. We currently need interims as several of our churches are being served by pulpit supply until an interim can be found. In NEA alone there are 6 retirements. In these settings we are beginning the transition process early rather than waiting until the retiring minister has left and an interim is in place. I am grateful to be a guide and resource for our churches in the search and call process. I am also grateful to welcome new colleagues to our association and conference.

Shared Ministry

This past year we've have several of our churches move toward Shared Ministry, sharing a pastor(s) in two or more churches. This has become a trend as church membership declines and the pool of candidates seeking to serve in a part-time position shrink. Additionally, some of our churches already doing shared ministry are moving toward mergers.

Conflict Transformation Team

This team is trained by Lombard Mennonite Peace Center who continue to be the gold standard for this ministry. This year the Conflict Transformation Team has written several articles for our Wisconsin Conference life and offered workshops.

The teams are actively working with our churches in our associations. We continue to receive support and appreciation for their ministry. They are available to help our churches with developing guidelines for building healthy relationships and communication skills, conflict mediation and developing core values. They have the supervision and support of Sandbur Associates. I continue to resource and provide leadership for this team. The team has been doing great work at resourcing one another across association lines, which is very helpful.

Communities of Practice (COP)

This program continues to grow. We have 25 groups in the Conference. This year we added a new group for Members in Discernment. We continue of offer a COP group for MIDs who are also serving as a licensed pastor in a congregation. We have added a new COP group for retirees, one for chaplains. We had 36 clergy new to COP sign up last fall. I have great appreciation for our COP facilitators, who work tirelessly to lead and support the clergy in the joys and challenges of ministry, especially in this time when so much adaptation in church ministry is needed.

Unified Member in Discernment Assessment Team (UMAT)

This year all the Association Division on Church and Ministry teams agreed to a centralized assessment process for our Members in Discernment. The new (2018) Manual on Ministry shifted the guidelines for how Committees on Ministry determine the fitness of each Member in Discernment and their readiness to serve in authorized ministry role in and on behalf of the United Church of Christ. The new model is complex in nature. Thus, assessment is intricate and complicated. The scope of work and the skill sets needed to assess fairly and equitably have stretched beyond the capacity of the Committees on Ministry suggested a team model whose sole focus of ministry is to work with MID's and their COM Advisors in this assessment and development of learning covenants that will help the MID meet the Marks for Faithful and Effective Ministry. The Unified MID Assessment Team (UMAT) is to assist Committees on Ministry in each Association in their work to determine how each MID meets the Marks for Ministry. I am grateful for having a representative from each association to do this work together. We launched our work last fall and working hard with all our MID's that COM's have referred to us.

Anti-Racism Training

The Commission on Ministry, which has sought to bring all four associations of the conference together regarding best practices for authorization, support, and oversight, has been working on this for the last 5 years in concert with Committees on Ministry. Last year we put together a team with representation from both WI and MN to design the first anti-racism training opportunity. They did a fabulous job, and we are grateful.

We realize there are many excellent anti-racism training opportunities available to you as clergy. We commend these to you, should you choose to go that route, and we will list those approved trainings on our website. But all the other trainings we found are more expensive and time intensive.

The first module in the anti-racism course we in the WI & MN Conferences have developed is called Exploring Implicit Bias. This anti-racism training course is being offered through the Damascus Project and be available for clergy in both MN and WI. It does fulfill the standing requirement in all the associations. This last year we had over 60 clergy from WI Conference take the course. We will offer again Spring and Fall of 2024. We hope clergy will enjoy this first module and other modules will be developed in the coming years.

Word of Gratitude

I am grateful to work with such a talented, creative, devoted staff in the Wisconsin Conference. Each Wisconsin Conference staff member is exceptional and strives to make our common life better in every way. I'm especially grateful to Franz who is an exceptional leader for our staff and Conference Minister. I'm grateful to my clergy colleagues across the conference who are both talented and skilled for this ministry in challenging times, especially during this pandemic. It is my pleasure to serve alongside you in mission and ministry.

- Attending monthly in-person staff meetings on the sacred grounds of Daycholah Center, the new location of the Wisconsin Conference offices

Of course there is so much more that makes up the work we do and much of what is most meaningful to me never makes the highlight reel: the profound and vulnerable 1:1 conversations over coffee or a walk, the joy of watching a child in worship run up with glee to meet their pastor for the "children's moment", holding space with you as you grieve – whether it's the loss of a loved one or the sale of a church building, dreaming and scheming with you about what we as church are called to be.

Beloved of God,

We continue to grow into our post-pandemic ministries in many ways. There has still been quite a bit of transition in our Association as some ministers have moved away and others have received calls to settled ministry. We are thankful for those who have served with us in previous years, and are excited by the new ministry partners who have joined us.

Our Administrative Team of the SE Association has finally been fully staffed. I am very thankful for the contributions of our new treasurer Tim Reilly and our new secretary Mike Whiteley. Our Associate Conference Ministers have been busy supporting our congregations in transition, as well as, pastors in Search and Call. They, supported also by the Conference Conflict Management Team, have also supported both congregations and pastors when significant conflict has occurred in our common ministry.

I am very excited to have with us for our Annual Meeting the Rev. Sandhya Rani Jha (they/them). They are a pastor, an activist, and an author. Most recently Sandhya published <u>Rebels, Despots, and Saints: The Ancestors Who Free Us and The Ancestors We Need to Free</u> which uses narrative analysis to help us feed our souls and to show us again and again the Good News of our faith throughout the generations. Drawing on our stories, the stories of our ancestors, and the stories of others that we learn from – we are emboldened to live more and more fully into the Gospel today. Sandhya's work helps us to be unburdened by generational stories that are no longer serving us, while also allowing us to

move forward with other generational stories that speak to today and will give our children spiritual food for the future.

While we still face uncertain futures, our outlook is a bit crisper this year as we all work to serve God and our neighbors. We are hopeful that we are working to share the teachings of Jesus to the next generation. So, let's "Tell the Next Generation" our stories and encourage their faith in God.

Mission Team - 2023 Annual Report

The Mission Team met several times. Grants now can be requested for up to \$400. This is up from the previous limit of \$250.

Guest House of Milwaukee has a proven track record of assisting even those with the most severe challenges to overcoming homelessness regain and maintain their independence, including: mental illness, addiction, physical and cognitive disabilities, and history with the criminal justice system.

Core Programs

Our programs and services are designed to address the full spectrum of homelessness, including prevention, shelter, clinical services, housing, and long-term case management.

HOUSING & PREVENTION

Our Prevention, Rapid Re-housing, and Permanent Supported Housing programs help more than 450 Milwaukee County men, women, and families secure a permanent, affordable place to live, and ensure that participants are able to maintain that housing once placed. We provide outreach and financial assistance to help bridge any income gaps, and employ case managers to connect our clients to community resources that support their independence.

CLINICAL SERVICES

The Guest House Counseling Clinic is certified by the state of Wisconsin and is dedicated to providing quality outpatient mental health and substance abuse counseling services to Guest House clients. We focus on serving adult men and women with mental health, substance abuse, and co-occurring diagnoses. Our staff delivers client-centered, trauma-informed, and gender-responsive counseling. Through one-on-one and group work, our clinic uses an individualized, goal-oriented approach to help individuals work on their issues of drug and alcohol addiction, stabilize their mental health, and connect with community resources to maintain sobriety and mental health for long-term success.

CASE MANAGEMENT

We provide long-term case management for men and women who are working their way through addiction, mental health issues, or both. The key staff members in this program work to empower clients by tailoring services and resources to meet the individualized needs of those served by this program. Together, the client and case manager identify an array of supportive services to attain, and ultimately maintain, independent living.

Interfaith Conference of Greater Milwaukee – 2023 Annual Report



MISSION, VISION, AND CORE VALUES

2023 NOTABLE EVENTS

The Interfaith Conference issued statements and/or its faith leaders participated in rallies against hate and violence, including to antisemitism in response to hate-filled leaflets distributed in Wisconsin; asking for increased fair housing protections; rallying on the anniversary of the invasion of Ukraine; supporting the adoption of a climate plan for the City of Milwaukee; and in reaction to gun violence in our community, supporting legislation to close gun show loopholes and to support red flag laws.

The Interfaith Conference's educational programs included its 4 Tuesdays in March program, which carried the theme "Democracy In Peril"; sponsoring programs on white supremacy and Christian Nationalism by Rev. Butler; presenting on what faith leaders can do to prevent gun violence at an emergency gun violence summit; beginning a series of webinars on Going Green in 2024 through use of the Inflation Reduction Act; and presentations on different faith practices to Rockwell and MATC.

The Interfaith Conference continued its partnership with the Wisconsin Council of Churches in arranging to conduct Covid-19 vaccination clinics and educational events. The Conference also collaborated with other partners on issues of health inequity and providing information concerning cancer and cardio care.

The Interfaith Conference reinstituted a continuing Amazing Faith Dinner Dialogue (AFDD) program in July with a dinner hosted on the last Wednesday of every month at a different place of worship or nonprofit location every month. The Conference also is in discussion with Marquette University and UWM to begin AFDD events on college campuses in 2024.

The Interfaith Conference formally announced the hiring of Ahmed Quereshi as its Executive Director. On December 4, 2023, it held its 53rd Annual Luncheon at Marquette University's Alumni Memorial Union Ballroom, entitled "Setting a Table for Solidarity" which more than 230 persons attended. The Franciscan Peacemakers received the Rev. Herbert Huebschmann Urban Ministry Award; James Santelle received the Frank Zeidler Award; Rabbi Levi & Leah Stein received the Mark Rohlfing Memorial Award; and Nicole Gorelik received the Emerging Leader Award. The keynote speaker was Venice Williams and Dr. Zulfiqar Ali Shah concluded the event with a prayer for peace.

Wisconsin Foundation UCC Annual Report




The Wisconsin Foundation UCC serves as a community foundation for UCC congregations and closely related organizations in Wisconsin. The foundation exists as a subsidiary of the conference – meaning that every congregation in the conference "owns" the foundation. The foundation can provide sound investment opportunities, fundraising assistance, and capacity building because of the growing number of congregations investing through the foundation. When a congregation partners with the foundation, they help make all our congregations stronger.

Fifth Anniversary

The conference started the foundation in 2019. The foundation invests on behalf of agencies (primarily congregations), the conference, and its own funds. Investing together ensures access to good investment management at a better fee than any one organization could get on its own.

The foundation's investment pool allowed the foundation to make a programmatic investment in United Church Camps, Inc., at a crucial time in the camps' history. The loan from the foundation – interest only for five years – supported the camps as they navigated the Covid-19 Pandemic. Every congregation invested in the foundation helped make this important support available to the camps while also earning a solid return on the investment.

The funds invested through the foundation more than doubled since its inception (see graph). In addition to the loan to UCCI, the Pension Boards manages the remaining investments. The foundation's investment pool earned a 14.12% return in 2023.



Churches invested pay approximately 1.05% in investment and administrative fees. These fees allow the foundation to provide guidance and support to agencies. A portion of the fees come back to the

conference in the form of "Common Service" revenue in the conference budget; \$30,000 in 2023.

The foundation aids agencies (including churches) in raising new dollars for mission and ministry. From 2020, the foundation raised an average of \$273,794 annually for agencies invested in the foundation.


Tools for Congregations

Many congregations struggle to promote gifts in wills or to receive gifts from stocks. The foundation partnered with the Pension Boards to bring new tools to help congregations. A new bequest site allows donors to make a gift in their will to any Wisconsin Conference congregation, the conference, the camps, and national ministries. A "smart giving" site helps donors make gifts from a Donor Advised Fund (DAF), an IRA account, appreciated stocks or crypto. Finally, the foundation released a Together for Tomorrow Planned Giving Manual to help congregations make the most of these tools and other opportunities for planned gifts. Promoting planned giving will be an increased focus for the foundation in the coming year.

Legacy Congregations

The foundation assists congregations on the threshold of closure. The leadership of Ebenezer UCC in Stratford, WI (NWA), realized their increasingly small

congregation could not continue. "Our current council leaders have long served in their roles and cannot continue indefinitely doing this work," Moderator Sue Vick said. "While we tried to recruit new people as volunteers, we do not see people stepping forward to volunteer." The Council worked with Andrew Warner of the Wisconsin Foundation UCC to develop a legacy plan designed to create a new future for the 4-acre cemetery that sits beside the church building. The Council recruited new people to form a cemetery association, and Andrew advised the new board on its incorporation.
